When I spoke with Angel, he told me he had saved money to get them something, but his car repairs took all his extra money. I gave the information to Pat and Carla to fix Christmas boxes for the boys. When Angel came to pick up the gifts, he shared that the oldest boy was being bullied because he didn't have a backpack or book bag. This was a last minute thing, and the gifts were not wrapped, but wrapping paper, etc. was sent with him for Angel to wrap. I had him check to be sure the gifts were suitable even though they had been prayed over when they were packed. In the box was a backpack for each, a game and a Bible along with a few small stocking stuffers. Angel left happy that the boys got a Bible. He really wanted them to have one as they did attend church. Angel was truly a living Angel.

Immediately, the people of Kingsway jumped into action to help him in any way we could. One of our volunteers took him to the Goodwill and bought him a coat and other clothes to keep him warm in the freezing temperatures of mid-January. But the goodhearted people of Kingsway were not done yet. We bought him a ticket back to his home in Ohio and even drove him to Charlottesville where

Kingsway's 2018 Apple Tree Project was a huge success thanks to the many goodhearted volunteers and supporters who gave their time and donations to make this Christmas a truly special time for hundreds of children who's parents couldn't be there due to incarceration. Kingsway Prison and Family Outreach is a Christian ministry that was started in 1985 by Shel and Louise Jennings to bring Christ into the hearts of inmates and help them both inside prison and when they reenter society.

This year we mailed more than 300 boxes of gifts to 320 children throughout the state of Virginia. Each box contained two wrapped gifts plus a Bible or other Christian book for each child, appropriate for their age and gender, as well as small stocking stuffers. In addition, we put together over 6,000 inmate gift bags that contained a notepad, pencil, toothpaste and chap-stick. These items were distributed at facilities such as the Harrisonburg Rockingham County Jail, Harrisonburg Diversion Center, Augusta Correctional Center, Fluvanna and Coffeewood prisons among others.

This monumental task was only accomplished because of the generous gift and monetary donations of the many people who wrapped the presents and filled the inmate's gift bags. Bob Wade Auto Group helped to pay for a majority of the shipping charges. And many thanks to Pat Crouse, Kingsway's Associate Director, who organizes and coordinates the entire operation. The love, generosity, volunteer involvement and the spirit of Christian fellowship was truly a Blessing. The Spirit of the Lord moved everyone to do their part to assure that the children of the incarcerated had a memorable Holiday Season.

The addict can be a doctor, lawyer, student, minister, etc. Below is a testimony of a formal addict:

William's Story

At the age of 12, I was already drinking hard alcohol, and one year later I started to smoke cannabis. This totally messed up my schoolwork, as I was smoking it almost every day. I ended up with a criminal record at 16, and without any education, I was homeless and always in trouble.

One day I was looking out of the window and saw an old girlfriend, someone whom I had not seen for quite a few months. I waved to her, and we started talking about what we had been doing since we last met. She told me that she had become a Christian. She Invited me to a meeting and mentioned there was free food. (I went because of the food.)

However, something happened that changed my life forever. I was challenged to find out if God existed. I was shown in the Bible that I had to turn my life around and find God, and ensure my eternity-and I decided to try it out. At the next meeting, I prayed and accepted Jesus as my savior and was baptized.

I met up with some of the Christian Group a few days later, and after chatting for a while, one of them asked me "how it was going with my drug usage, smoking, etc." to which I had to answer "I haven't even thought about it!" —no desire for drugs, no lack of peace! The second miracle.

Since then, I have seen this happen on countless occasions and experienced many other answers to prayer. It has not always been a bed of roses, and a few times, due to my selfishness and pride, I have found myself to be very far from any semblance of Christianity-but He never casts us aside and through it all, I have never been able to deny that *Jesus Christ is alive and is indeed*,

Mental Illness and the Criminal Justice System: A Need for Reform and Removal of the Stigma of Mental Illness

What do you think of when you hear the words mental illness? Often society views these people with great suspicion and prejudice, as dangerous and belonging only in a state of perpetual confinement. Of course, you or someone you know might be suffering with this debilitating disease. To be sure, views on mental health issues have certainly evolved

over the decades, but this evolution has actually led to an increase in the percentage of the prison population with mental health disorders. The reason for this is that in the 1970's and 80's, many institutions and state hospitals that used to house and treat the mentally ill began to close. The simple fact is that jails and prisons essentially cannot and do not treat mental health issues, which is understood to also account for substance abusers as well, as these two conditions often go hand in hand. Often, these situations have an all too familiar theme: abuse or neglect as a child, drug use (often seen as a form of selfmedication), incarceration, probation, little to no job prospects which may lead to re-offense or more drug use, both of which result in re-incarceration. We as a community need to find ways to maximally divert vulnerable individuals out of the criminal justice system and into treatment. Mental health screenings and access to affordable, quality psychiatric care are but a few ways in which we can begin to reform how we view mental illness and the nega-
